Trustees' annual report

The trustees present their report and the audited financial statements for the year ended 31 July 2020.

Reference and administrative information set out on page 1 forms part of this report. The financial statements comply with current statutory requirements, the memorandum and articles of association, the requirements of a directors' report as required under company law, and the Statement of Recommended Practice – Accounting and Reporting by Charities: SORP applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with FRS 102.

Objectives and activities

Purposes and aims

The trustees review the aims, objectives and activities of the charity each year. This report looks at what the charity has achieved and the outcomes of its work in the reporting period. The trustees report the success of each key activity and the benefits the charity has brought to those groups of people that it is set up to help. The review also helps the trustees ensure the charity's aims, objectives and activities remained focused on its stated purposes.

The trustees have referred to the guidance contained in the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when reviewing the charity's aims and objectives and in planning its future activities. In particular, the trustees consider how planned activities will contribute to the aims and objectives that have been set.

Public Benefit

The Association has maintained and increased its commitment to public benefit, as demonstrated in this report and referenced in the Object of our Association 'to champion and promote good sexual health and provide education in relation to sexually transmitted infections, HIV and other sexual health problems to the public'. The Association's work, across all sectors of the community, in representing the interests of sexual health services, in advancing public health, in championing and promoting good sexual health and high quality standards of care, as well as providing education to the public and health care professionals, all benefit the public.

BASHH's work in delivering modern educational programmes, developing cutting edge guidance and information commission assured patient resources, and in seeking to support and influence decision makers in local and national government are all aimed at safeguarding high quality, confidential sexual health services for the public benefit. BASHH has a dedicated public engagement group and area of the website.

The BASHH guidelines sit on the public facing side of the BASHH website and are accredited by NICE. The process used by the Association to produce its guidelines was re-accredited by NICE in May 2016 and is valid until January 2021. The guideline section remains the most visited area of the website. Our Standards for the Management of STIs are widely endorsed and are used by commissioners in service specifications and to measure performance. The Association also

provides support to local and national government through expert advice, representation and briefing papers to promote good sexual health for the entire health community.

The trustees confirm that the association has fully complied with its duty to have regard to public benefit in accordance with the Charity Commissions public benefit guidance and has met the requirements set out in our Objects.

Objectives, Activities and Performance

The charity's main activities and who it tries to help are described below. All its charitable activities focus on providing high quality education and training, as well as leadership for those delivering sexual health and HIV services, and are undertaken to further the British Association for Sexual Health & HIV's charitable purposes for the public benefit.

Mission Statement

BASHH Aims:

- To be the lead professional representative body for those practising sexual health including the management of STIs and HIV in the UK
- To innovate and deliver excellent tailored education and training to health care professionals, trainers and trainees in the UK
- To determine, monitor and maintain standards of governance in the provision of sexual health and HIV care
- To advance public health in relation to STIs, HIV and other sexual health problems
- To champion and promote good sexual health and provide education to the public

Education Committee

The Education Committee is responsible for facilitating the delivery of the BASHH's vision, values and service priorities through education, training and development. The Educational committee (EC) and Special Interest Groups (SIGs) develop and maintain educational programmes providing high levels of specialist training and skill, whilst embracing a wider, more integrated sexual health remit across a wide geographical area and range of healthcare settings.

The COVID pandemic has brought new challenges in delivering education and training which our members have risen to impressively by embracing new technology and going on a steep learning curve to become familiar with new ways of teaching online. While we have all missed the pleasure of seeing our colleagues in real life there have undoubtedly been advantages as many more BASHH members have been able to access meetings in the convenience of their homes, work places or other far flung locations.

The Special interest groups (SIGs)

The SIGs lead on the development of educational materials and meetings within their specialist areas. They develop and deliver educational programmes and courses. They also contribute to

education and training by generating publications and research, developing guidelines and recommendations in collaboration with other BASHH groups and external organisations, and reviewing and responding to documents on behalf of BASHH. Individual reports detailing specific contributions are available within the BASHH Annual Review.

This year before COVID, the SIGs provided several well-established courses such as the Genital dermatology and Genital dermatology plus courses, Masterclass in Sexual Dysfunction and the Diplomas in GUM and HIV revision courses. There have also been new courses developed including the international High Resolution Anoscopy Course organised by the HPV SIG which ran in November 2019. Since March 2020, many of these courses have transferred to the online platforms successfully including the SAS doctors' conference, STIF courses and HIV Masterclasses.

BASHH scientific meetings

The EC has the responsibility of providing quarterly Scientific meetings, which are free to BASHH Members. SIGs take it in turn to organise these meetings and they often take a two-part structure, organised by two individual SIGs.

This year, the Autumn meeting was replaced by a BASHH symposium at IUSTI in Talinn led by the ASIG. We used the funds set aside for running the September meeting to support BASHH members with discounted IUSTI registration, giving Doctors in Training, SAS and Nurse and Health advisor members preference when applying for these 30 places.

The January meeting was led by the GSM and HIV SIGs and the March meeting was organised by Bacterial SIG and Public Health England. These were both well attended with excellent evaluation. Podcasts/webcasts of the lectures are available on the BASHH website for members to access in their own time if they are unable to attend the meeting.

We held our inaugural virtual Scientific meeting in July with a theme of innovations and best practice in the COVID era which was well attended and the virtual breakout rooms proved to be a good way of stimulating discussion and sharing ideas.

Scholarships, Fellowships and Travel awards

The Education Committee supported the BASHH/PHE Fellowships and the Education Committee's own BASHH Educational Fellowships which this year were awarded to Dr Hannah Church and Dr Ellie Crook. Hannah is undertaking a project on recruitment to the specialty supervised by Prof Margaret Kingston and Ellie will be looking at the undergraduate curriculum supervised by Dr Ashini Fox and Dr John Evans-Jones.

Future events are expected to be online and the Education committee has set up a virtual education subgroup led by Dr Luciana Rubinstein with the aim of developing some best practice guidelines on how to run virtual training events.

Clinical Governance Committee

Membership

This committee consists of regional representative from all of the branches in England, and a representative from the UK devolved nations, Northern Ireland, Scotland and Wales. In addition, there are professional group representatives from Nurses, Health Advisers, Pharmacists, Staff & Associate Specialists, and Doctors in Training. Other groups within BASHH feed into this committee: The Clinical Effectiveness Group, the Clinical Standards Unit, the National Audit Group, the Integrated Information Group and the Web Team.

Objectives

- To implement strategies and policies of BASHH as approved by the Governing Board
- To oversee, set and monitor standards and specifications relating to BASHH
- To identify areas of best clinical practice and promote their adoption whilst recognising local variation in capacity, infrastructure and policy
- To identify regional and individual clinic difficulties and support such services to explore solutions to issues, mobilize support and suggest action plans

Meetings

The Committee holds meetings on the same days as the Scientific Meetings. In the year ended 31st July 2020, one telephone (adobe connect) and two face to face meetings were held at The Royal Society of Medicine. This was followed by a further virtual (Zoom) meeting during the COVID-19 pandemic. Meetings are supported by BASHH administration team and minutes published on the website.

In addition to the quarterly meetings, during the pandemic, a Whatsapp branch chairs group has been set up for timely discussions around service concerns. Virtual meetings were held on alternate weeks to facilitate face to face discussions in April and May 2020.

Significant activities

Spotlight discussions were held on topics generated by representatives.

During the pandemic, the CGC was an important communication channel between BASHH and its membership. The CGC discussed various challenges in service delivery as they came up and found collective solutions. They helped ensure regional members participation in BASHH surveys and thus obtain meaningful data to guide BASHH activities during the pandemic.

The Branch Chairs also function as the Regional Speciality Representatives (RSA) of the Royal College of Physicians. They ensure that the recruitment process of doctors within the speciality meet standards by approving job descriptions.

Performance/Outputs in the year 2019/20

- The CGC was an effective channel to disseminate intelligence and information rapidly during the COVID-19 pandemic.
- Pharmacist representative was appointed.
- Several clinical governance issues were discussed and strategies for management were circulated, after discussion with relevant Special Interest Groups where appropriate.
- The engagement of all four nations in CGC enabled a broader understanding, shared experience and expertise and collaborative management.

Accurate minutes of all CGC meetings were kept and published.

Future plans

- To support BASHH commitment to equitable geographical provision of on-line services that support high standard face to face sexual health services
- To support BASHH to lead on the development of coherent holistic sexual health strategies for all four nations in the UK in the next decade.
- To support development of national PGDs.

Public media and website activities

2019-20 has seen a continued flow of media requests. Usual topics including STI rates and antimicrobial resistance have been interjected with topical issues including PrEP roll out and more recently covid. We received a significant number of enquiries relating to how covid and lockdown have affected both services and STI rates. These enquires have been fulfilled by various members of the media group and have been coordinated with other organisations such as PHE and BHIVA where appropriate.

The BASHH media team continue to work with Munro & Forster to provide timely response to media requests.

BASHH continues to be seen as a reliable source of expertise as demonstrated by the significant number of media enquiries we receive including from mainstream organisations such as the BBC and major print media outlets.

A major highlight of this year's Public Panel was making the panel larger and more diverse. Four new BAME members have joined as well as two new young members. The panel has led on the development of four new sexual health VLOGs (MSM Health; Emergency Contraception; Chlamydia; Getting Tested) which are aimed at users and potential users of sexual health services. The panel has made important contributions to the updating of six clinical guidelines, two patient information leaflets and the strategy document on re-establishing sexual health services produced by BASHH. It has given a lay perspective on the new GUM / HIV training curriculum and its members have joined several study planning groups as lay representatives.

The BASHH websites remains a well-used repository of information for its members and the public. In addition to the frequently accessed national guidelines it has been a source of covid-19 resources for clinicians during this challenging time.

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Social media activity remains important with a further increase in Twitter followers, now sitting at over 9000.

BASHH continues to be a voice for the specialty and our patients, raising awareness and promoting the importance of high quality sexual health care through media engagement and linkage with relevant public bodies.

Beneficiaries of our services

BASHH beneficiaries are members of the association and any members of the public or medical profession who access our freely available web resources.

Financial review

2020 was a financially challenging year for BASHH. As the result of COVID-19 lockdown, BASHH had to cancel all its training and educational events between February and September 2020. The impact of COVID-19 on BASHH accounts was a mixed one, reducing BASHH income and expenditure; by 31% and by 44% respectively. As the result, BASHH made a surplus of £15,301 before net losses on investments (2019: deficit of £144,802 before net gain on investments) in the financial year ending on 31 July 2020.

The main drivers of our expenses are our educational meetings and secretariat fees. The reduction in BASHH expenses was mainly the result of cancellation of payments for hiring venues for BASHH events because of COVID-19 lockdown; 53% less than that in 2019. BASHH's negotiation of contracts with the publishers of the journals also assisted in this respect; 47% less than that in 2019.

COVID-19 lockdown put significant strain on BASHH's cash flow during the lockdown period. As the result, BASHH's saving accounts depleted by 33% in 2020.

Due to the impact of Covid-19 on markets, the value of BASHH investments have decreased by a loss of £73,425 (2019: increase by a gain of £82,180). It is important to note that without the investment income the association's costs currently and during the last couple of years outweigh its income from its normal charitable activities. As we expect a turbulent few years post Brexit for the stock market, it would be important to note that our finances may come under strain in the coming years.

Principal funding sources

Income for the charity comes from investments, membership subscriptions, and educational events. Because of the charity's stable financial position, the annual membership fee was not increased in 2019.

At 31 July 2020, the charity has total reserves of £1,696,660 (2019: £1,754,784). This comprised of £4,150 (2019: £4,150) restricted reserves, £10,000 (2019: £10,000) endowment fund, and

£1,682,510 (2019: £1,740,634) unrestricted reserves. Unrestricted reserves have fallen by £58,124 from prior year (compared to an decrease of £62,622 in 2019) mainly due to an overall reduction in costs as a result of meetings being cancelled due to the pandemic.

Reserves policy and going concern

Investment and Reserves policy

The Trustees aim to invest BASHH reserves within Charity Commission guidelines:

• Taking financial advice where appropriate, giving due continuous and careful consideration of risk / diversification / protection and allowing for sufficient access to maintain a contingency for the running of BASHH.

Reserves

The Trustees' intention is to maintain the level of reserves at an amount sufficient for the Association to function for at least two years in the event that it does not receive any further income. The trustees consider the investments of £1,615,474 (2019: £1,638,868) to form part of the charity's free reserves as they are able to access the income and/or capital as required. Free reserves of £1,682,510 (2019: £1,740,634) are in excess of the reserves policy as costs for the next two years can be covered by disinvesting the investments if required.

Investment policy

An amount sufficient for the Association to function for at least one year will be kept in accounts which permit access to funds within a maximum of 3 months.

The balance of reserves will be invested after taking professional financial advice and adopting a low to medium risk approach. BASHH uses two different investment companies (St James' and Sarasin) for managing its investment portfolio).

Review

The Trustees will review this policy whenever appropriate and as a minimum at least annually.

This Investment and Reserves Policy was approved by the Trustees on 24 May 2019.

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Principal risks and uncertainties

BASHH uses a Risk Management Plan as a tool to identify potential risks which the charity may encounter. The plan identifies the source of potential risks, assesses each against criteria of seriousness and likely frequency, and makes recommendations on mitigating the risk including the identification of responsible individual(s). The plan is reviewed annually by the BASHH Finance and Governance Committee before being taken to the Board of Trustees for further amendments and approval.

BASHH reviewed its Risk Management Plan during the year to identify potential risks which the charity may encounter. The plan identifies the source of potential risks, assesses each against criteria of seriousness and likely frequency, and makes recommendations on mitigating the risk including the identification of responsible individual(s). The Risk Matrix was updated by the Finance and Governance Committee on 13 September 2019 and subsequently 21 May 2020 and approved by the Board on 29 May 2020. Particular new risks identified were: risks directly to BASHH business and to volatile markets due to the Coronavirus Pandemic. Risks to BASHH reputation from uncontrolled or inappropriate content posted on social media on behalf of BASHH.

Mitigations to reduce risk include:

- requiring funding proposals submitted to the BASHH Board to include an assessment of risk
- the use of guidance notes to assist BASHH members who run educational events on the charity's behalf e.g. draft contract template, advice on obtaining sponsorship
- automated collection of educational event fees via the BASHH website
- annual external financial audit
- separation of powers via a Scheme of Delegation which is reviewed annually by the Trustees
- spreading the BASHH investments between two brokers who have diverse portfolios
- adopting a social media policy for all contributors of social media content

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Plans for the Future

BASHH is strongly committed to the smooth running of its core business over the coming year and delivering on its charitable objectives. The Association will continue to champion the provision of quality, accessible sexual health and HIV services within the mixed commissioning environment with an appropriate workforce and adequate funding. We will provide representation to the national governments and key policy and decision makers, as necessary, for all four nations in the UK.

BASHH pressed for gender-neutral HPV vaccination and this was implemented in autumn 2019. BASHH will consider pressing for maximum delivery and uptake of gender neutral HPV vaccination, including funding of a catch-up programme for those who missed the vaccinations and for others who may benefit but were outside the programme in autumn 2019. BASHH will also continue to press for HIV PrEP to be available to all high risk individuals throughout the UK, along with continuing to promote good antibiotic stewardship to reduce the risk of antimicrobial resistance.

We will provide a wide range of educational activities to support clinicians to deliver first rate care as in previous years with sufficient financial governance to assure this as a sustainable resource for members and non-members.

We aim to merge the Standards for the Management of STIs with our other standards in the next 1-2 years and will continue with our rolling review of current guidelines as their review date becomes due. We will continue to embed and extend our social media profile.

The Association will continue to build on its existing relationships with a wide range of national representative bodies, professional and third sector organisations as well as other sexual health stakeholders and will work collaboratively to maximise opportunities to improve all aspects of sexual health and HIV across the UK. We will lead the development of a new Sexual Health Strategy for England and work towards the establishment of a specific lobby group on Sexually Transmitted Infections within the framework of the All-Party Parliamentary Group system.

Financial plans for future periods

In order to maintain good governance on our costs, the chairs of BASHH groups and events receive quarterly financial statements on their groups' income and expenses. Major departures from the usual cycle of events include the finalising of the BSIG Microscopy online project and investment in an eportfolio for a STIF competency training package. The future of professional conferences in a face to face format is uncertain over the next few years. In October 2020 BASHH ran a virtual conference using specialist software which required a one off payment. It is likely that in the next one to two years conferences will be either wholly or in part run virtually using such platforms, so continued budgeting will be required.

BASHH has also retendered its secretariat support service.

Structure, governance and management

The organisation is a charitable company limited by guarantee, incorporated on 28 November 2011 and registered as a charity on 18 July 2012.

The company was established under a memorandum of association which established the objects and powers of the charitable company and is governed under its articles of association.

Governing document

The governing document for BASHH is the Memorandum and Articles of the Association, which was signed on the 30 September 2011 by the first Trustees of the incorporated organisation. Since then, further resolutions were agreed on 9 January 2015 and on 13 March 2015. It provides details of the objects; powers; benefits to members and Trustees; membership and Trustee arrangements; general meeting conditions; notices, resolutions and voting provisions; the requirement for records and accounts; and the particulars of indemnity, limited liability, guarantee and dissolution of the Association. A further revision of the Articles of the Association was approved by the membership on 13 October 2017.

The main objectives of BASHH, as stated in its governing document are

- To promote, encourage and improve the study of and the practice of diagnosing, treating and managing sexually transmitted infections, HIV and other sexual health problems.
- To innovate and deliver excellent tailored education and training to health care professionals, trainers and trainees in connection with the provision of sexual health and HIV care
- To determine, monitor and maintain standards of governance in the provision of sexual health and HIV care
- To advance public health in relation to sexually transmitted infections, HIV and other sexual health problems.
- To champion and promote good sexual health and provide education in relation to sexually transmitted infections HIV and other sexual health problems to the public.

All trustees give their time voluntarily and receive no benefits from the charity. Any expenses reclaimed from the charity are set out in note 7 to the accounts.

A governing Board of at least 12 elected Trustees governs the Association, the immediate past President and a lay Trustee appointed by the elected Trustees. The Trustees are also directors of the charitable company. Currently there are 19 Trustees. The voting membership of the Board consists of: –

- The President who is the Chairperson of the Board
- Six Board Officers Vice President, General Secretary, Honorary Treasurer, Conference and Communication Secretary, Chair of the Education Committee, Chair of the Clinical Governance Committee

- The immediate past President of BASHH Six Fellows of BASHH
- One Specialty and Associate Specialist Member of BASHH One Doctor in Training Member of BASHH
- One Nurse Member of BASHH
- One Health Adviser Member of BASHH One Lay Trustee

A number of non-voting representatives are co-opted to the Board to provide additional support. These include the Chair of the Media group, Chair of the Public Panel, BASHH Webmaster, Revalidation representative for BASHH. Other BASHH members/fellows may be co-opted as necessary.

The Clinical Governance Committee, which reports to the Board, deals with all aspects of clinical governance and standards as well as providing a major communication channel to and from BASHH members. It consists of Branch chairs who represent the members in regions across England, Scotland, Wales and Northern Ireland, as well as health adviser, nurse, and doctors in training representatives. Also reporting to the Clinical Governance Committee are a number of BASHH Groups such as the National Audit group, Clinical Effectiveness Group, Clinical Standards unit and the Integrated Information Group.

The Education Committee, which reports to the Board, leads on the educational and training activities for BASHH. It consists of the Chairs of a range of Special Interest Groups (SIGs) and also includes the leads for the STI Foundation Group and Mentoring Group as well as key training course leads.

In addition, the Association has a number of other groups and representatives that report directly to the governing Board such as the Revalidation representative, the Web Team and the Public Panel.

Support Services

A variety of support services are in place to support the work of the Association and its administration. Since 2013 central support services (secretariat, membership and financial) have been provided by Kingston Smith Association Management (KSAM). This has allowed BASHH to streamline support services to facilitate a more comprehensive and integrated administrative structure including administrative support of the BASHH Annual Conference.

Following a review of the secretariat performance and the needs of BASHH, it was agreed by the board that a competitive tender process should be undertaken towards the end of 2019 to determine the best provider of services once the KSAM contract expires on 31st January 2021. This was a rigorous process involving shortlisting against a new service specification and structured interviews. The recommendation was to award the new contract to Executive Business

Support Ltd (EBS). EBS was ranked the highest amongst applicants, particularly due to their specialism and expertise with associations like BASHH and having highly rated references from Trustees of other medical associations. This was approved by the Board on 28 February 2020. EBS will become BASHH's support service from 1 February 2021.

Membership Review

The membership services have been administered by KSAM since 1 February 2013. Membership recruitment remains strong and there have been new applications for membership into both medical and the non-medical categories, reflecting our multidisciplinary ethos, as well as a number of resignations by retirement, deaths and a number of members suspending their membership whilst on maternity leave.

The total number of members on 31 July 2020 was 1,087 (2019: 1,076). Through a membership drive to attract nurses to join BASHH, along with a reduced membership rate and educational and training opportunities such as STIF Competency, the number of nurse members has increased considerably. Nurse members had increased to 136 nurse members in July 2020.

BASHH has continued to work to ensure that the membership categories are simplified, that members are correctly categorised according to their membership grade and that membership details are kept up date. New members can join using an online application form without the requirement for support by a fellow and member, and all applications are reviewed by the General Secretary and ratified by the BASHH Board.

The simplified categories also streamlined the options for joining journal subscriptions. From January 2020 the two journals, STIs and International Journal for STD and AIDs, switched to electronic with member access through the BASHH website rather than hard copy delivery by post. Board approved substantially reducing subscription rates for doctors in training for a four-year period commencing in August 2017. Membership cards are issued to all members to allow electronic registration at BASHH events and automatic CPD registration at CPD approved events. Most members prefer to be communicated with electronically and a decreasing number have communication sent by post.

Recruitment and Appointment of the BASHH Board

The BASHH Board is recruited from the BASHH members and fellows of BASHH, except for the immediate past President who is automatically a member of the Board as is the lay Trustee. The lay Trustee is recruited and appointed from outside the Association by the elected Trustees, using an external process followed by informal interview of selected individuals. For all the other Board positions BASHH members are individually informed about the posts that are available and nominations are sought.

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For the year ended 31 July 2020

Appointments and elected positions are for a term of office of two years and those appointed/elected may stand for a second two-year term, except for the President who may not serve a consecutive second term.

The election process allows voting prior to the Annual General Meeting for contested posts – candidates for Trustee positions and members of the Clinical Governance Committee. This was conducted by the Electoral Reform Service (ERS) using a secure online voting website, as well as paper voting where necessary.

A detailed approach to governing the operations of the Board and appointment to trustee posts is laid out in the Articles and Byelaws, accessible to the public on the website.

Trustee induction and training

Individuals who have been elected to Trustee posts are required to make a declaration of interests and an undertaking of commitment as a Trustee to BASHH. They are required to submit a Trustee declaration form to the Charity Commission and complete the process for appointment as a BASHH director by successful submission of an APOI form to Company House.

All Trustees receive the Memorandum and Articles of Association and the Association uses the extensive information on the Charity Commission website to support the induction and training of Trustees. In particular, all Trustees are directed to read the Charity Commission guidance – the essential trustee: what you need to know (CC3).

BASHH Officers received Trustee Training by Karl Elliot of Voluntary Action North East Lincolnshire on 3 and 9 September 2020. The agenda covered:

- 1 Fundamentals about governance and trusteeship
- 2 A model for good trusteeship
- 3 Duties of Trustees: delivery of objects, use of resources, managing conflicts of interests
- 4 Being effective trustees: The legal trustee, The focused trustee, The well-behaved trustee, The informed trustee
- 5 Towards better governance using frameworks such as the Charity Governance Code

Related parties and relationships with other organisations

BASHH has affiliations with our sister organisation, The British HIV Assocation (BHIVA) and has representatives who feed into the medical specialties board of the Royal College of Physicians (RCP).

The total number of such guarantees at 31 July 2020 was 20 (2019: 19). The trustees are members of the charity but this entitles them only to voting rights. The trustees have no beneficial interest in the charity.

Notes to the financial statements

For the year ended 31 July 2020

1 Accounting policies

a) Statutory information

British Association for Sexual Health and HIV (BASHH) is a charitable company limited by guarantee and is incorporated in England and Wales.

The registered office address is 68 Chestergate, Macclesfield, SK11 6DY.

b) Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) – (Charities SORP FRS 102), The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Companies Act 2006.

Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy or note.

In applying the financial reporting framework, the trustees have made a number of subjective judgements, for example in respect of significant accounting estimates. Estimates and judgements are continually evaluated and are based on historical experience and other factors, including expectations of future events that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances. The nature of the estimation means the actual outcomes could differ from those estimates. Any significant estimates and judgements affecting these financial statements are detailed within the relevant accounting policy below.

c) Public benefit entity

The charity meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102.

d) Going concern

The trustees consider that there are no material uncertainties about the charity's ability to continue as a going concern.

The trustees do not consider that there are any sources of estimation uncertainty at the reporting date that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within the next reporting period.

e) Income

Income is recognised when the charity has entitlement to the funds, any performance conditions attached to the income have been met, it is probable that the income will be received and that the amount can be measured reliably.

Income from government and other grants, whether 'capital' grants or 'revenue' grants, is recognised when the charity has entitlement to the funds, any performance conditions attached to the grants have been met, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably and is not deferred.

Subscription Fees

Subscriptions are payable in advance for the Association's Membership Year. Subscriptions for the Membership year ended 31 July 2020, which were not received at the time of preparation of these accounts, are considered to be uncollectable and accordingly no credit is taken into the accounts.

Educational Meetings

Income from educational meetings and courses is included in incoming resources in the period in which the relevant activity has taken place and consists of course registration fees from participants and sponsorship income from pharmaceutical companies net of VAT where applicable. Where sponsorship income received is related to a specific meeting or conference then this income has been accounted for as income arising from those specific activities.

f) Interest receivable

Interest on funds held on deposit is included when receivable and the amount can be measured reliably by the charity; this is normally upon notification of the interest paid or payable by the bank.

1 Accounting policies (continued)

q) Fund accounting

General funds are unrestricted funds which are available for use at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the charity and which have not been designated for other purposes.

Designated funds comprise unrestricted funds that have been set aside by the trustees for particular purpo ses. The aim and use of each designated fund is set out in the notes to the financial statements.

Restricted funds are funds which are to be used in accordance with specific restrictions imposed by donors or which have been raised by the charity for particular purposes. The cost of raising and administering such funds are charged against the specific fund. The aim and use of each restricted fund is set out in the notes to the financial statements.

Endowment funds

Endowment funds represent those assets which must be held permanently by the charity, principally investments. Income arising on the endowment funds can be used in accordance with the objects of the charity and is included as either restricted or unrestricted income funds. Any capital gains or losses arising on the investments form part of the fund. Investment management charges and legal advice relating to the fund are charged against the fund.

h) Expenditure and irrecoverable VAT

Expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to make a payment to a third party, it is probable that settlement will be required and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is classified under the following activity headings:

- Expenditure on charitable activities includes the costs of delivering services and other educational activities undertaken to further the purposes of the charity and their associated support costs
- Other expenditure represents those items not falling into any other heading

Irrecoverable VAT is charged as a cost against the activity for which the expenditure was incurred.

i) Allocation of support costs

Resources expended are allocated to the particular activity where the cost relates directly to that activity. However, the cost of overall direction and administration of each activity, comprising the salary and overhead costs of the central function, is apportioned on the following basis which are an estimate, based on staff time, of the amount attributable to each activity.

Where information about the aims, objectives and projects of the charity is provided to potential beneficiaries, the costs associated with this publicity are allocated to charitable expenditure.

Where such information about the aims, objectives and projects of the charity is also provided to potential donors, activity costs are apportioned between fundraising and charitable activities on the basis of area of literature occupied by each activity.

Governance costs are the costs associated with the governance arrangements of the charity. These costs are associated with constitutional and statutory requirements and include any costs associated with the strategic management of the charity's activities.

i) Listed investments

Investments are a form of basic financial instrument and are initially recognised at their transaction value and subsequently measured at their fair value as at the balance sheet date using the closing quoted market price. Any change in fair value will be recognised in the statement of financial activities. Investment gains and losses, whether realised or unrealised, are combined and shown in the heading "Net gains/(losses) on investments" in the statement of financial activities. The charity does not acquire put options, derivatives or other complex financial instruments.

k) Debtors

Trade and other debtors are recognised at the settlement amount. Prepayments are valued at the amount prepaid.

I) Cash at bank and in hand

Cash at bank and cash in hand includes cash and short term highly liquid investments with a short maturity of three months or less from the date of acquisition or opening of the deposit or similar account.

1 Accounting policies (continued)

m) Creditors

Creditors are recognised where the charity has a present obligation resulting from a past event that will probably result in the transfer of funds to a third party and the amount due to settle the obligation can be measured or estimated reliably. Creditors are normally recognised at their settlement amount.

n) Financial instruments

The charity only has financial assets and financial liabilities of a kind that qualify as basic financial instruments. Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at transaction value and subsequently measured at their settlement value.
